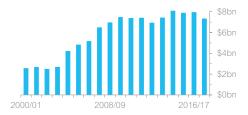

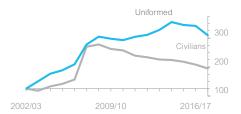
PEACEKEEPING BUDGET TRENDS

Combined budget of PKMs incl. UNSOS in \$bn 2



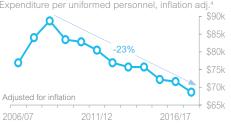
DFS SUPPORTED PKM PERSONNEL

WHAT WE DO

- The Department of Field Support (DFS) is a service provider for international peace operations, including UN and non-UN peacekeeping, special political and other field missions.
- DFS works with UN and non-UN partners to plan, mobilise and sustain peace operations in the world's most complex environments.
- Our core services range from budget, finance, personnel, procurement, logistics, technology and infrastructure to supply chain and asset management.
- In 2017/18, the authorized uniformed and civilian personnel in DFS-supported peace operations is about 153,800 and the combined budget is \$7.5 billion.
- Globally, up to 14,500 support personnel deploy to 35 peace operations in more than 30 countries, including 16 peacekeeping operations, 17 special political missions and 2 other operations.
- DFS-supported peace operations account for the large majority of the UN Secretariat's budget, personnel and procurement.

OUR MISSION

 We help international peace operations succeed with support solutions that are rapid, effective, efficient and responsible.

OUR VISION

We strive to be recognized for operational excellence: consistent, reliable and sustainable results.

OUR ENVIRONMENT

- The newest field missions are in large, remote and land-locked areas with poor markets and infrastructure.
- Most missions are likely to face continued security risks, incl. increased targeting of UN personnel and asymmetric threats.
- Conflict, disasters or crisis may require rapid mission up- or downscaling.
- **Downward financial pressure** will not relent and cost-increases must be offset.
- Several missions, incl. UNAMID, UNMIL and MINUSTAH are in transition phases.

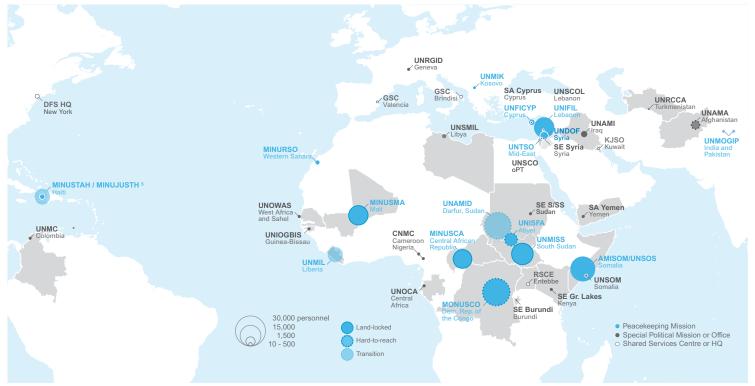

 - -MINUJUSTH budget pending proposal for mandate starting 16 October 2017 for an initial period of six months;
 - -UNMIL budget of \$110m for maintenance of mission (1 July 2017 to 30 June 2018), reflecting mandate expiry on 30 March 2018, with withdrawal of all uniformed and civilian components by 30 April 2018, except those needed for liquidation. Civilian staff quoted here includes UNVs.
